VCWA MAKES A DIFFERENCE

We are pleased to report on another productive year for the Council. This is the 64th year, of the founding of the Vermont Council on World Affairs by Vermont Senator Warren Austin, who later became the first U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, along with some fellow-minded Vermonters.

Patricia Preston completed her first full year as Executive Director. We welcomed a record number of 200 foreign visitors from the State Department and U.S. Congress programs this year. These visitors came from 70 countries. The informal motto of the Council is to “Bring the world to Vermont and Bring Vermont to the world,” and we certainly did this by introducing numerous groups to Vermont’s government leaders, business leaders and our wonderful environment.

We also hosted a very successful Ambassador’s Program graciously underwritten by Norwich University. Ambassador Robert Ford, the former U.S. Ambassador to Syria, spoke at a number of events, as did Ambassador Peter Kemc of Slovakia. There were public presentations as well as private dinners and receptions.

Our 8th annual Awards Dinner honored Congressman Peter Welch. It was a major success both financially and -more importantly- as a way to honor a Vermonter who exemplifies so well the core values of the Council.

Our hosting a record number of visitors could not have been accomplished without the work of Vinson Pierce, the newest addition to the staff. Vinson submits all group proposals and accompanies all visitors during their stay. Patricia and Vinson make an excellent team, and we express our thanks for a job well done.

Our coming year should be even bigger and better than our last. We anticipate increasing the number of visitors, and we look forward to welcoming five new members to the Board.

This is our final report as Co-Chairs. We will be stepping down in December and welcoming an excellent replacement, Leigh Cole. We are looking forward to the energy she will bring to the task.

This year we drastically increased the total number of delegates visiting Vermont, welcoming groups focusing on topics as diverse as Cartoons and Graphic Novels, Tourism and Economic Development, and Combating Poaching and Wildlife Trafficking. Thanks to everyone involved in our programs, each delegation has left Vermont with fond memories of the time spent in our state and lasting relationships with those who are fortunate to call it home. I look forward to what the next year holds and am excited to continue working to promote Vermont as a leader and innovator in so many different fields.





November 5-6: Eleven visitors from Europe visited Vermont to discuss the Transatlantic Trade and Investment Partnership and meet with the Vermont State Commission on International Trade and State Sovereignty.

November 7-12: Seven visitors from around the world visited Vermont to learn about social entrepreneurship.

November 8-11: Five visitors from Cameroon visited Vermont to learn about women in politics.

March 30-April 2: Three visitors from France visited Vermont to learn about low carbon energy technologies.

April 2-7: 21 visitors from around the world visited Vermont to learn about inclusion of people with disabilities for the 25th anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

May 11-15: Sixteen visitors from around the world visited Vermont to explore the tourism sector and economic development initiatives throughout the state.

May 30-June 2: Three visitors from Kazakhstan visited Vermont to learn about youth leadership initiatives.

June 11-15: Eleven visitors from around the world visited Vermont to explore efforts to combat trafficking in persons.

June 16-19: Four visitors from Venezuela visited Vermont to explore initiatives addressing underserved and at-risk youth.

July 23-27: Six visitors from Russia visited Vermont to learn about comics and graphic novels.

August 7-10: Two visitors from India and Nigeria visited Vermont to learn about the role of the arts in community and economic development.

August 13-17: Six visitors from Central Asia visited Vermont to learn about the renewable energy sector and efforts to combat climate change.

August 24-27: Ten visitors from South Korea visited Vermont to explore the non-profit sector and corporate social responsibility efforts.

September 3-8: Three visitors from Australia visited Vermont to learn about efforts to adapt to climate change and promote the renewable energy sector.

September 13-17: Seven visitors from North Africa and the Near East visited Vermont to discuss refugee resettlement challenges.

September 15-18: Eleven visitors from Africa visited Vermont to learn about efforts to combat poaching and wildlife trafficking.

September 17-22: Five visitors from the Philippines visited Vermont to learn about programs that serve to support and promote women entrepreneurs.

The Open World Leadership Center's mission is to enhance understanding and capabilities for cooperation between the United States and the countries of Eurasia by developing a network of leaders in the region who have gained significant, firsthand exposure to America's democratic, accountable government and its free-market system. The VCWA has been hosting Open World groups since 2000. These intensive, week-long programs give visitors the opportunity to delve deeply into a single issue. Visitors almost always stay with host families, enriching the experience on all sides. This year we hosted a wonderful group:

October 21-29: Six visitors from Kazakhstan visited Vermont to *explore the role of social media and access to information in establishing more accountable governance*. We kicked off the visit with a reception followed by meetings with representatives from Champlain College, the Burlington Police Department, Front Porch Forum, VTDigger, the Vermont Division of Emergency Management and Homeland Security, the Vermont Department of Tourism and Marketing, and more. Each delegate presented about their work in a very engaging program.
